All staff and student information was uploaded to the National Digital Library Website, and they now have access to over 2,09,95,951 books. In order to gain admission to the library, students must have a bar code on their ID card.

College Bazaar with self help groups.

Despite all of the progress that women have made in the professional world, gender-divided roles continue to be a difficulty. our college MBA students conduct College Bazaar every year. This year also there were several stalls in the bazaar, and all of the major students were present. On the eve of the Bazaar, students were given the opportunity to start a business of their choice, complete with product, service, and food stalls. Students took advantage of the chance to display handcrafted pen holders, photo frames, greeting cards, soft toys, personalised key chains, and a variety of other innovations.

Conduct ICT oriented teaching learning process with ICT centers and Creating Entrepreneur skill development centre More Placements to Students. .

The college's Career Counseling and Placement unit exists to assist students in achieving their career goals by providing guidance and assistance. It promotes higher education or studies, as well as selfemployment and job prospects. Several programmes were held by various departments, as well as the Professional Guidance Cell and the Entrepreneurship Development Cell, to provide students with information on higher education and career options. In this regard, our college, in partnership with the Madurai Employment Division, arranged a training from July 10 to 14, 2019, during which many students were exposed to various competitions and won numerous prizes. Short-term skill training programme for BSNL, ICT, ATDC, and NFDC was organised on December 10, 2019, through Tamilnadu Skill Development Corporation. 292 students have been chosen for this more prestigious chance. As a result, many students were able to take advantage of work

During the first week of reopening, all first-year students were offered a one-week Bridge Course to bridge the gap between their school and college admission. Every year, before the start of the first semester classes, a bridge course for newly admitted students is held. The course's major goal is to help students bridge the gap between what they learned in school and what they will learn in college.

The Principal, Head of the Departments, Members of IQAC, Autonomy, Controller of Examination, Staff, Student Union Members, Student Representatives and many committees are knitted perfectly together to design and execute the plans in the hierarchy of governance. HODs are responsible for Department level Administration like Duties Allotment to Faculty, Maintenance of Laboratory, Department Library, Allocating subjects to the teachers concerned and framing time table as per the workload. They are also entrusted with the responsibility of conducting department level meeting staff meeting, organizing guest lectures, conferences, workshops and seminars. Both students and staff are welcome to offer their suggestions which will take the institution to glory. Many of their suggestions are being implemented and the outcomes are being edited periodically. The Principal converse staff meeting and open democratic articulations are voiced in the interests of the development of the institution. Normally HODs arrange for Parent Teacher Meetings and the performances of their wards and their attendance are reviewed. Staffs meeting both at the college level and at the department level are often convened to encourage and motivate the teachers for publishing articles in reputed research journals and to attend seminars workshops etc. Teachers being class tutors every first and third Wednesday meet their wards for an hour individually or in group and discuss their personal and academic issues and give counselling to them. Staff members are appointed as Coordinators,

Advisors etc to channelize the bubbling energy of the youth in making them participate in the programmes. Curriculum Designing: The designing of Curriculum exposes the decentralization and participative management. The Curriculum Development Committee of the curriculum prepare the programme structure for all programmes. The faculty members prepare the scheme and course content as per the given structure. The prepared syllabus is then placed in the Academic Council for the approval. Every year the institution collects the feedback on curriculum from Students, Teachers, Alumni, Parents and Employers.
