In 2014, the department is upgraded as Research Department with M.Phil. and Ph.D. (Full time and Part time) programmes. Out Department has 13 sanctioned faculty positions. Among them 10 faculty members possess Doctorate Degree. Four Faculty members got Guideship from Madurai Kamaraj University. At present there are 360 Undergraduate students, 60 Postgraduate students 4 M.Phil. students and 11 Ph.D. scholars are pursuing their studies. Gandhiji visited Madurai 5 times during his lifetime.
