

The Department of History was established in 1969 with an undergraduate course in History In 1975. M.A. History was introduced. In 2014, the department is upgraded as Research Department with M.Phil. and Ph.D. (Full time and Part time) programmes. Our Department has 13 sanctioned faculty positions. Among them 11 faculty members possess Four Faculty members got Guideship from Madurai Kamaraj Doctorate Degree. University. At present, there are 360 Undergraduate students, 60 Postgraduate students 4 M.Phil. students and 11 Ph.D. scholars are pursuing their studies. Gandhiji visited Madurai 5 times during his lifetime.
